MESSAGE FROM CHIEF HALES

As we conclude 2025, I find myself reflecting on a year defined by transformation and steadfast service. Spanish Fork Fire & EMS continues to grow and evolve to meet the needs of our vibrant and expanding city. Known as “The Home of Pride & Progress,” our community deserves a Fire and EMS model that mirrors those values. I am humbled and honored to lead such a dedicated team of 87 professionals who strive daily to provide a premier quality of life for our community.

This year was the busiest in our department’s history. We responded to a historical 4,276 incidents, representing a 9% increase from 2024. Our commitment to our healthcare partnership with Intermountain Spanish Fork Hospital also grew by 3%, with 1,079 interfacility transports completed out of Spanish Fork Hospital.

Beyond the numbers, our team met significant operational challenges with professionalism:

- **Life-Saving Rescues:** From the courageous bystander-assisted vehicle rollover rescue in the Spanish Fork River this January to the aggressive attacks on residential, commercial, and wildland fires throughout the summer, our crews have consistently protected lives and property.
- **Specialized Training:** We conducted specialized rope rescue training at the windmills and provided NWCG Red Card/Recertification courses to the entire department.
- **Mutual Aid & Leadership:** We were proud to see Battalion Chief Ashby deploy as a Plans Section Chief in Southern California during the catastrophic Eaton Fire, and it was our distinct honor to host the 2025 Utah State Firefighters’ Association Convention right here in Spanish Fork (the last was hosted in the city 50 years prior).

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Growth requires modern tools. This year, we made significant strides in upgrading our fleet and facilities:

- New Fleet Additions: We placed a new 3000 Gallon Water Tender, a Type 1/3 Engine, two new ambulances, and a new Air & Light Trailer into service.
- Technology & Safety: We completed the P25 switchover for our entire radio fleet and updated all Fire & EMS Zone apparatus and alarm stacks to ensure the fastest possible response.
- Station 61 Rebuild: Perhaps most significantly, we have selected an architect and CM/GC to begin the design and rebuild of Station 61. This facility is a vital step in moving from our volunteer roots to a modern, 24/7 professional operation out of a modern firehouse.

Our Fire Marshal's office has been instrumental in ensuring that our city's physical growth is safe. In 2025, we completed:

- 580 Total Inspections (including 426 business and 136 fire sprinkler/alarm inspections).
- 604 Plan Reviews to ensure new construction meets the highest safety standards.
- 103 PR and School Events, reaching our youngest citizens with the message of fire safety.

Our strength lies in our personnel. We saw our staff obtain 127 new certifications this year. Whether it is our 36 Full-Time Firefighter/AEMT/Paramedics, our 25 Part-Time shift staff, or our 20 "in-city" response firefighters, every member of this team is here for you.

Spanish Fork Fire & EMS deeply appreciates the support from our community. As our city continues to grow, so too must our fire and EMS services. Your backing is vital to ensuring we maintain the highest levels of readiness.

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FIRE & EMS OVERVIEW

The Spanish Fork Fire & EMS Department has a rich history of dedicated service to the Spanish Fork community and surrounding unincorporated Utah County areas. Founded on May 15, 1908, the department began with a company of twenty men under the leadership of its first Chief, Charles W. Booth. For over a century, the department operated as a volunteer-based organization, with early responders utilizing simple hose carts and responding from home or local businesses.

In 1920, the department modernized its fleet with its first triple-combination American LaFrance engine, and in 1934, the iconic Fire Station was built on Main Street. As the "Home of Pride & Progress" grew, so did the complexity of our mission. What began as a fire-only service expanded in 1974 to include Emergency Medical Services, a crucial addition that continues to represent the majority of our call volume today.

Initially operating with volunteer firefighters, the department has evolved into a hybrid model that includes part-time and full-time personnel. A historic milestone was reached in August 2024, when the department officially transitioned to 24/7/365 full-time staffing. This shift—along with the appointment of the city's first full-time Fire & EMS Chief Eddie Hales in 2022—has allowed us to meet the demands of a population that has nearly doubled in the last 20 years, significantly reducing response times and enhancing life-safety outcomes.

Operating from two strategically located stations, our department is responsible for the largest geographical coverage area in Utah County, spanning 584 square miles. This vast jurisdiction reaches from the rural expanses of West Mountain to the rugged terrain of Soldier Summit in Spanish Fork Canyon.

- Station 61 (370 North Main St): Our headquarters and historic home, currently undergoing a process to relocate and rebuild to support modern, professional 24/7 crews.
- Station 62 (2635 E Canyon Rd): A state-of-the-art facility opened to improve response times for the growing eastern bench and canyon areas.

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With a commitment to excellence and community safety, Spanish Fork Fire & EMS continues to adapt and grow. Our multi-faceted services include:

- Fire & Rescue: High-angle, swiftwater, and technical rescue operations.
- Emergency Medical Services (EMS): Advanced Life Support (ALS) and paramedic-level care.
- Specialized Response: Hazardous Materials operations and wildland fire mitigation.
- Community Health: Interfacility transports, CPR training, and public safety education.
- Prevention & Planning: Proactive fire prevention, detailed plan reviews, and code enforcement.

As Spanish Fork City continues to thrive, our department stands ready to serve, protect, and preserve the quality of life for every resident and visitor in our care.

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DEPARTMENT RETIREMENTS



Captain Paul Tomadakis retired after 20 years of dedicated service to the citizens of Spanish Fork. His career was defined by a profound commitment to the community—one that required countless hours away from his own family to ensure the safety of others. - Two new chainsaws were purchased for brush trucks.
- P25 Switchover was completed for all radio fleet.
- CWS Participation Commitment was met with \$92,000.00 of work completed.
- 256 certification tests were passed.
- 127 certifications were obtained by department staff.
- Selected AJC architect and SIRQ CM/GC to begin designing a rebuild of Station 61.
- Chief Hales was selected to be on the Utah Valley University Emergency Services Education Board.
- Obtained the Utah Firefighters' Restricted Account Grant for \$5000.00 to purchase a Thermal Imaging Camera for our new Rescue Truck.
- Conducted MCI Drill at Maple Mt. High School with South Utah County EMS Agencies.
- Ancef antibiotic was added to our medication toolbox to administer to trauma patients.
- 14 firefighters attended Winter Fire School 2025.
- Restitution from August 2024 Fuel Spill was obtained.
- Lydia James was awarded the Fire Chief "Pride & Progress" award by Chief Hales.
- Battalion Chief Jon Grangroth was awarded the Fire Officer of the Year Award.
- Captain Trevor Giles was awarded the Firefighter of the Year Award.
- FF/PM Ann Dearden was awarded the EMS Provider of the Year Award.

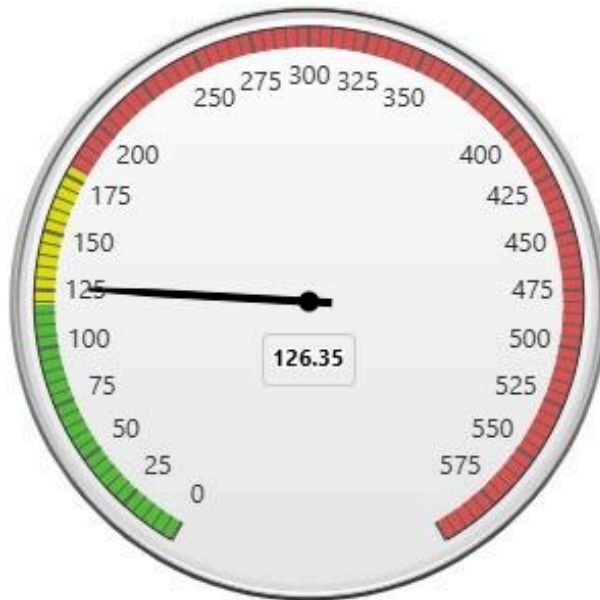
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Unit Average Turnout Time (Seconds)

Jan 01, 2025 to Dec 31, 2025



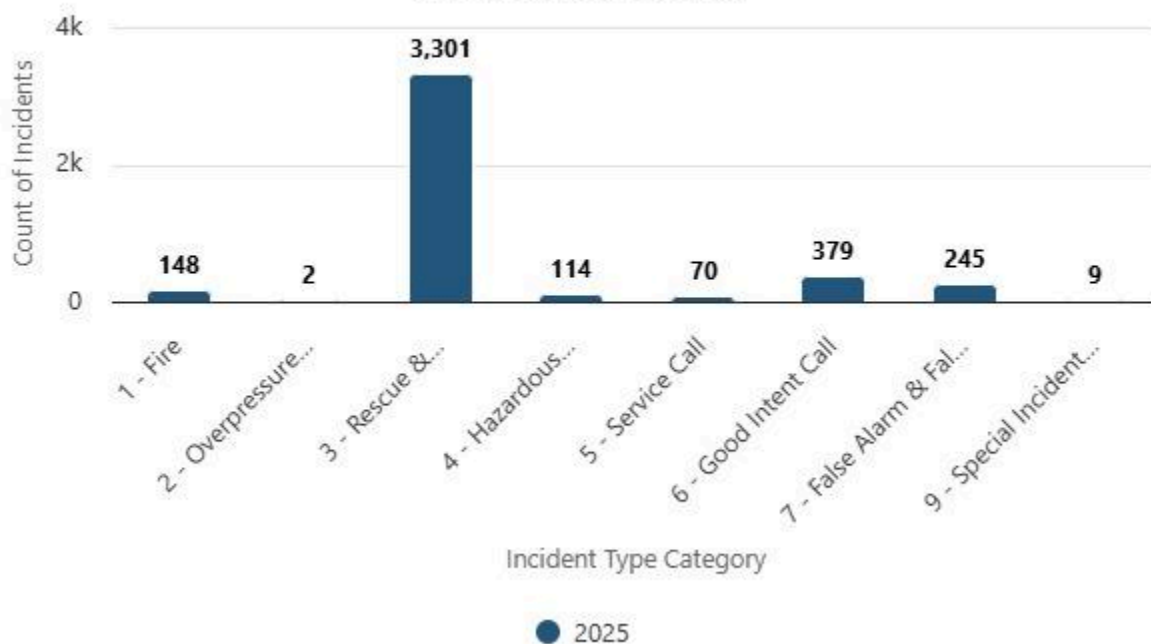
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Incidents by Category and Year

Jan 01, 2025 to Dec 31, 2025



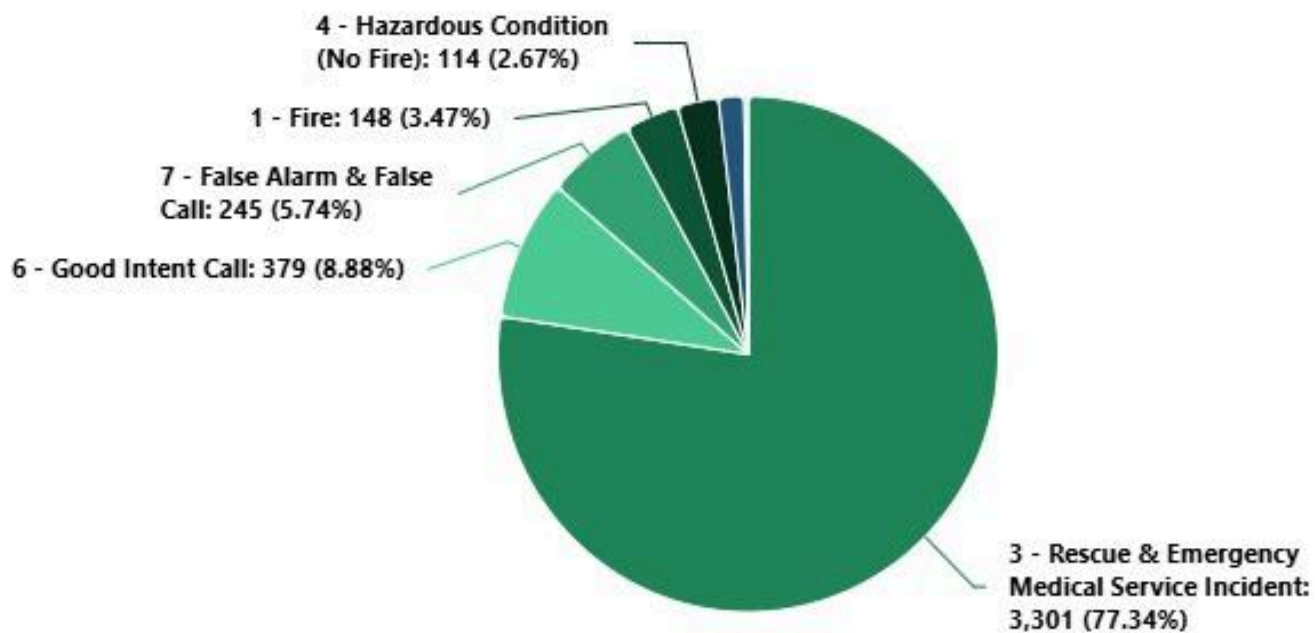
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Incident Type Categories

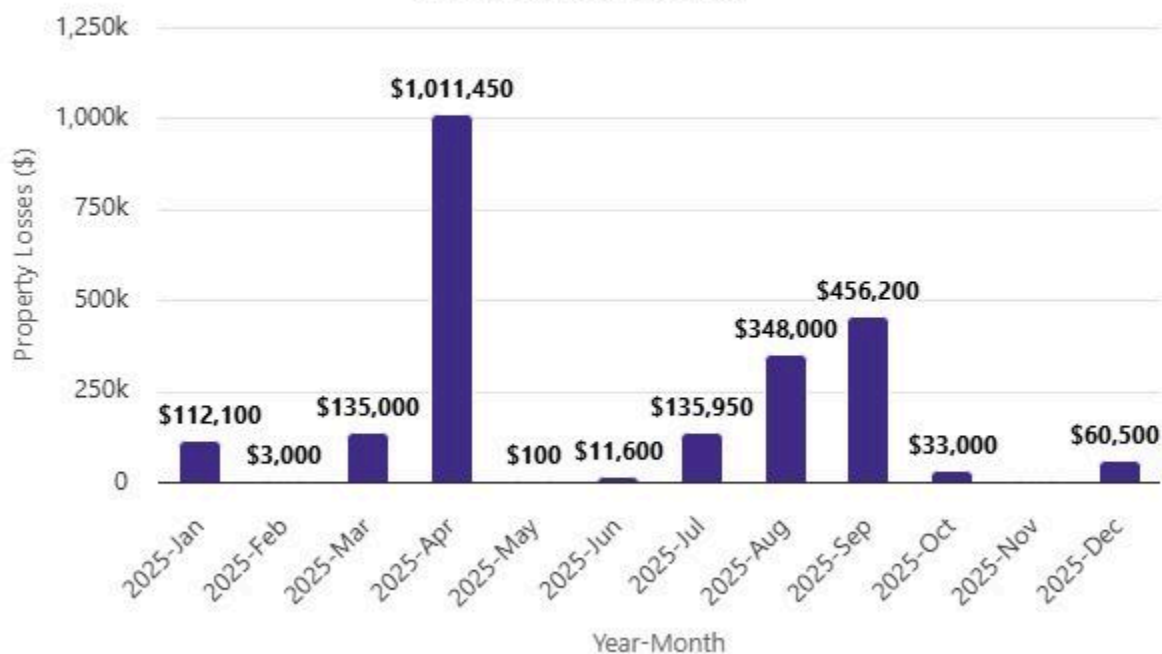
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Property Losses by Month

Jan 01, 2025 to Dec 31, 2025



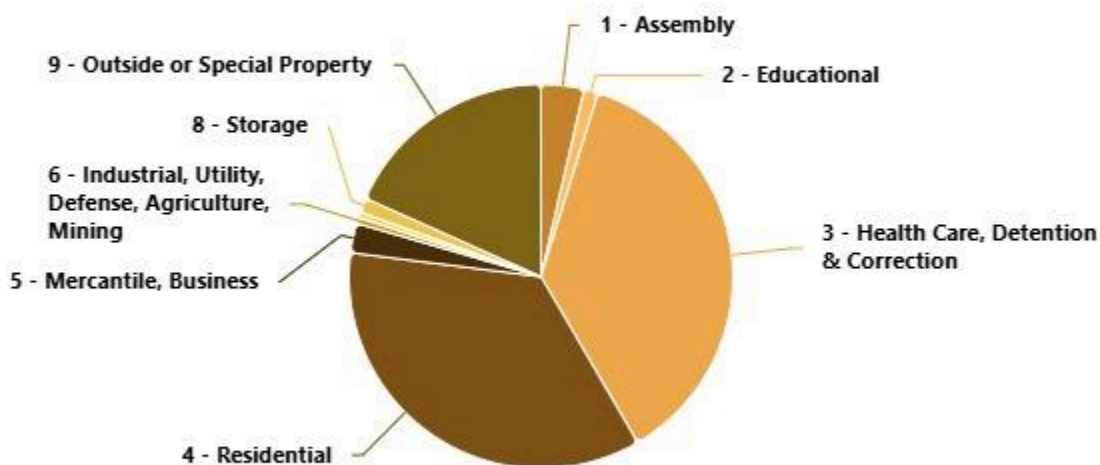
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Incidents by Property Use Category

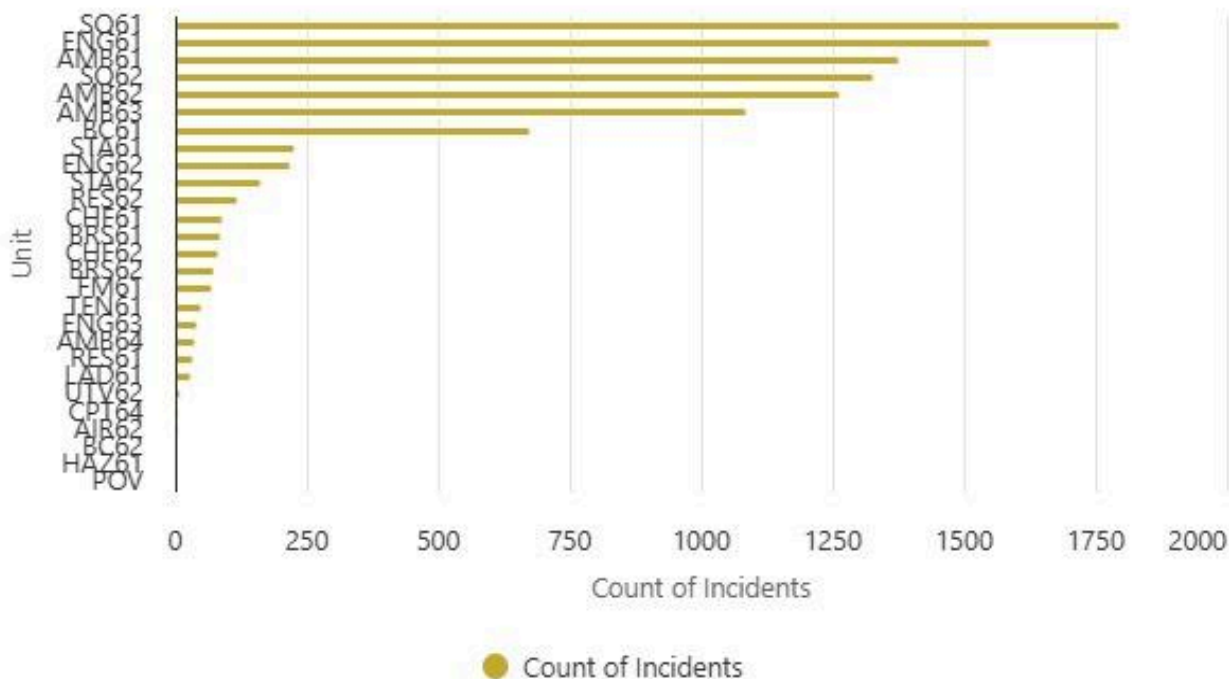
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Incidents by Apparatus Resource ID (Top 40)

Jan 01, 2025 to Dec 31, 2025



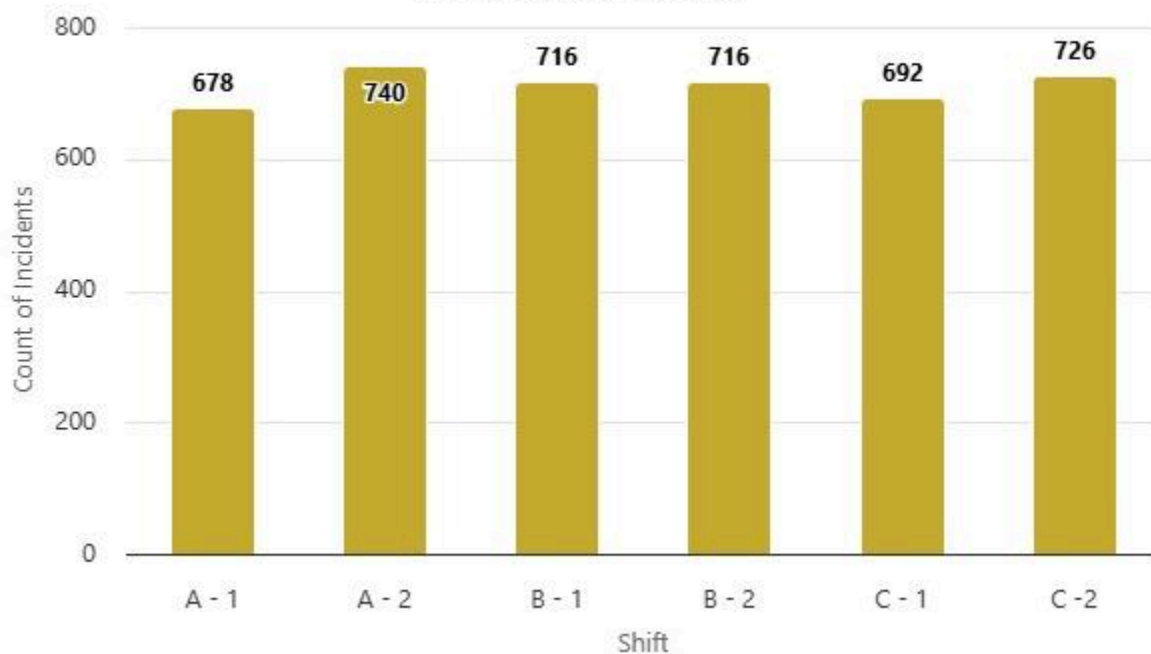
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Incidents by Shift

Jan 01, 2025 to Dec 31, 2025

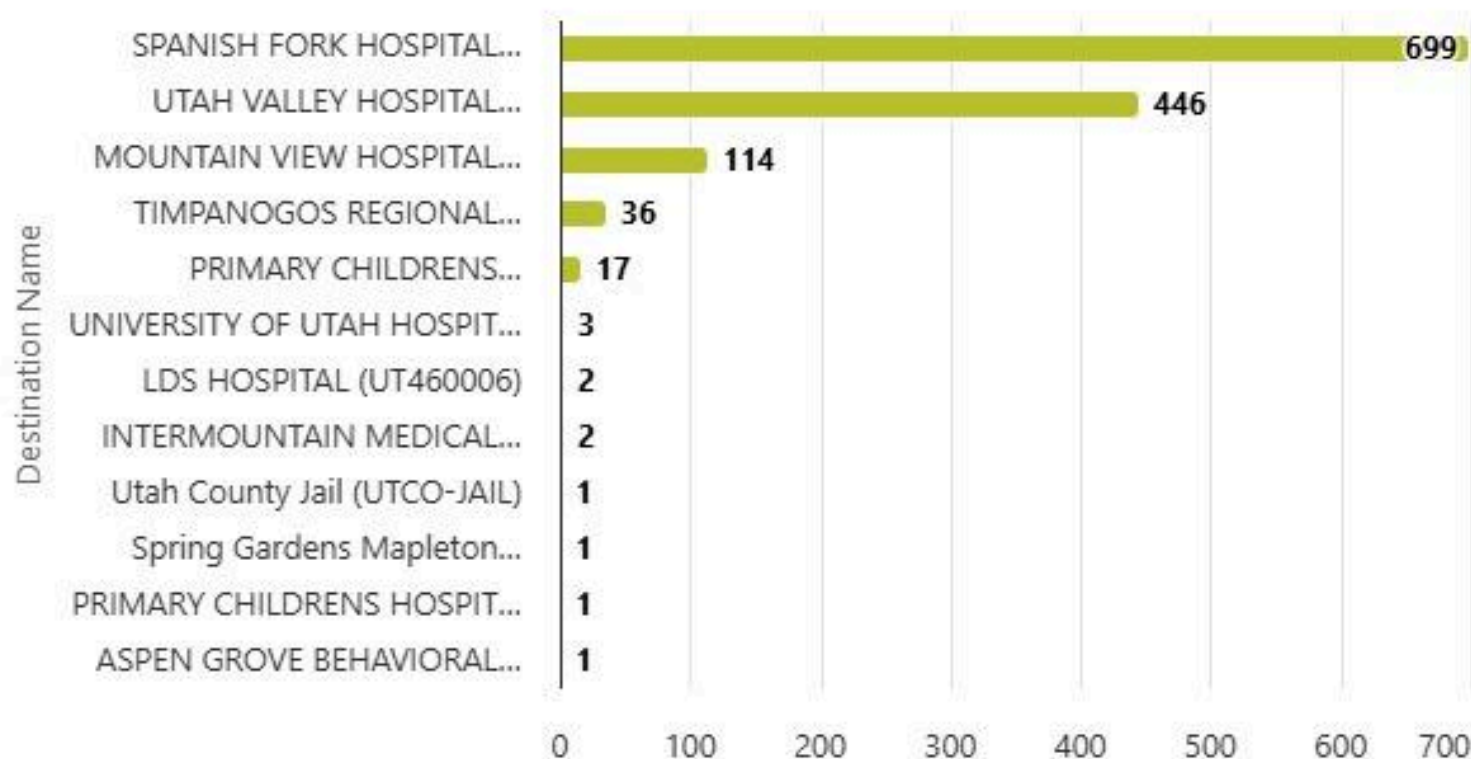


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Jan 01, 2025 to Dec 31, 2025



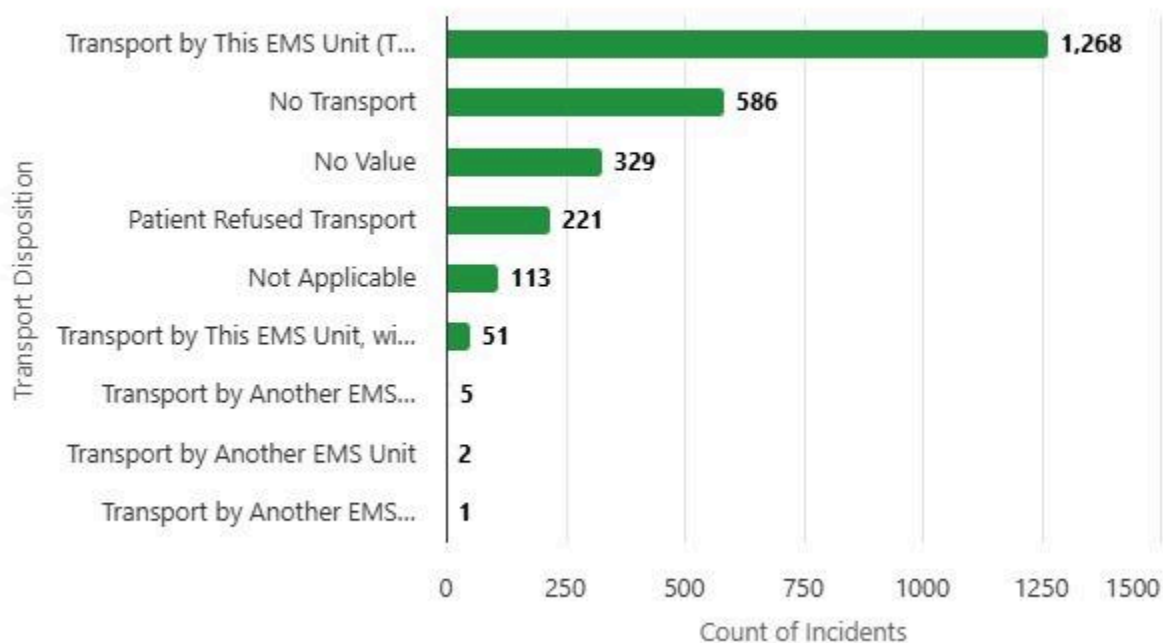
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Incidents by Transport Disposition

Jan 01, 2025 to Dec 31, 2025



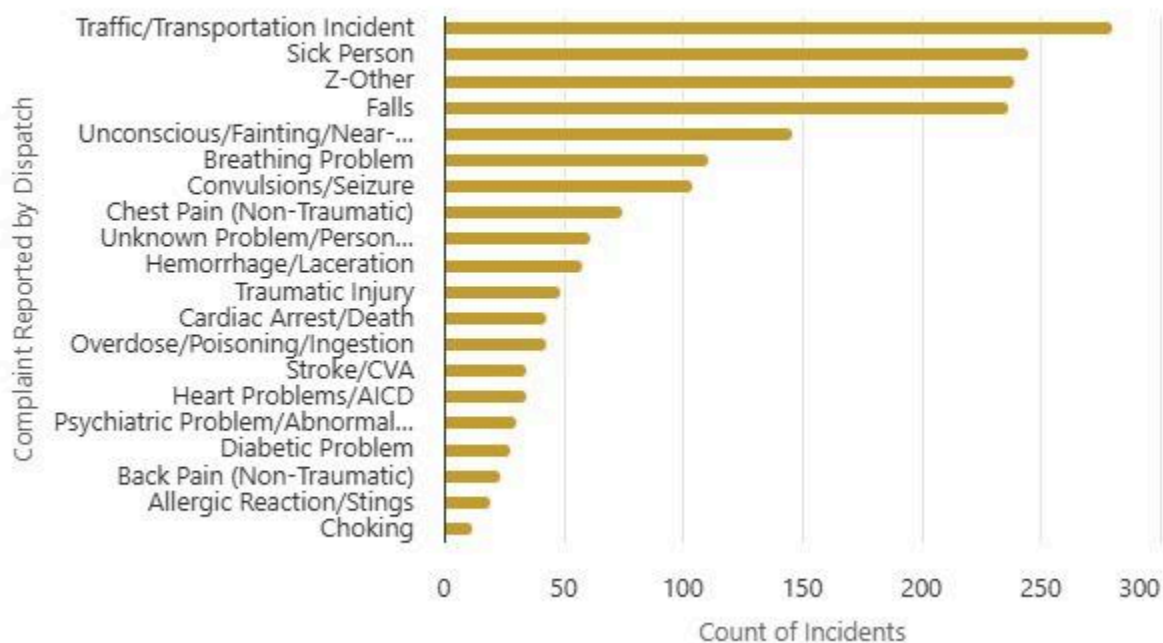
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Incidents by Complaint Reported to Dispatch (Top 20)
