Hazardous Waste Reporting

Hazardous Waste, as defined by 40 CFR 261, is prohibited by Spanish Fork from being discharged to the sewer, storm drains and waterways.

If Hazardous Waste is discharged, whether on purpose or accidentally, the following is required by the EPA and the Utah DEQ (40 CFR 403.12(p) requires a one-time report for each substance discharged to a POTW that, if otherwise disposed of, would be considered RCRA hazardous waste. 40 CFR 403.12(j) requires a report in advance of any substantial change in volume or character of any IU discharge).

Who Must Notify:

All Industrial Users (IU) that discharge a substance that, if otherwise disposed of, would be characteristic or listed wastes under 40 CFR Part 261 and meet the following criteria:

Total waste discharged is greater than or equal to 15 kg(33 lbs)/month; or Waste discharged is acute hazardous waste.

Notification Must Contain:

For hazardous wastes greater than or equal to 15 kg(33 lbs)/month or any quantity of acute hazardous waste, the one-time notification from an IU must contain:

- 1. Name of the hazardous waste as set forth in 40 CFR Part 261.
- 2. EPA hazardous waste number (code).
- 3. Type of discharge to the sewer (continuous, batch, or other).
- 4. A certification that the IU has a program in place to reduce the volume and toxicity of hazardous wastes generated to the degree it has determined to be economically practical.

If the IU discharges > 100 kg of acute or non-acute hazardous waste per calendar month to the POTW, the notification must also contain the following items of information, to the extent such information is known and available:

- 1. An identification of the hazardous constituents contained in the hazardous wastes.
- 2. An estimation of the mass and concentration of such constituents in the waste stream discharged during the calendar month in which the one-time report is made.
- 3. An estimation of the mass of constituents in the wastestream expected to be discharged during the 12 months following the notification.

Notification Must be Sent To:

- 1. Local Sewer Authority (i.e., POTW)
- EPA Region 8 Land, Chemicals and Redevelopment Division
- 3. <u>Division of Waste Management and</u>
 Radiation Control Utah Department of
 Environmental Quality

When the Notification Must be Submitted: All IUs must submit the notification <u>no later than 180 days</u> after the discharge of a hazardous waste.

In the case of newly identified hazardous wastes, the IU must submit a notification within 90 days of the effective date of such regulations.

The notification need be submitted only once for each hazardous waste discharged, except when there will be a substantial change in the volume or character of the hazardous waste discharged. In the case of a substantial change in volume or character (a long-term, not an episodic change, generally because of a planned change to the facility or operations), another one-time report is required.

The POTW may require additional reporting of these substances as it deems necessary. Spanish Fork prohibits Hazardous Waste, as defined by 40 CFR 261, from being discharged to the sewer, storm drains and waterways.
